


2018 YEAR IN REVIEW



2018 FESTIVAL HIGHLIGHTS

WELCOMED 22 filmmakers and special guests, including four student filmmakers, to share their films, perspectives, and expertise with audience members.



PRESENTED the seventh annual Conservation Filmmaker Workshop,

a two-day documentary filmmaking workshop, to 19 emerging filmmakers with 11 instructors from Smithsonian Channel, HHMI Tangled Bank Studios, National Geographic, National Park Service, and independent production companies.





SELECTED and screened 36 of the most compelling, diverse, and informative films from around the world to present over two weekends of the Festival. Film topics included scientists and conservation heroes, wildlife preservation, design innovation, water quality, climate change, sustainable agriculture, and more. Nearly 1,000 people attended.



OFFERED five short, naturefocused Virtual Reality films presented by Samsung, free to the public, during all six days of the Festival.



PRESENTED entertaining learning opportunities for children with the Backyard Wilderness film, pop-up exhibit, nature walk, and Bioblitz event, in partnership with the Potomac Valley Audubon Society.

THROUGHOUT THE YEAR

PRESENTED the 2017 Foreign Film Award winner, Giraffes: Africa's Gentle Giants, and the 2017 Student Film Award winner, Keeping the Potomac, as well as discussion with the filmmaker and river keepers from the Potomac Riverkeeper Network at our 6th annual Best of Fest at the Weinberg Center for the Arts in Frederick, Maryland. 235 people attended.

HELD a spring fundraiser in Shepherdstown, WV, featuring three films from the 2018 International Big Cats Festival (in partnership with the Jackson Hole Wildlife Film Festival), discussion with a wildlife biologist and a National Geographic video producer, and an Indian-inspired evening of food, drink, and music. Over 100 people attended.

PRESENTED a special screening of *Wasted! The Story of Food Waste,* followed by discussion with a butcher and executive chef who focus on local food sourcing at our 3rd annual Best of Fest at Barns of Rose Hill in Berryville, Virginia. Over 100 people attended.

PROVIDED a year-long internship to a Shepherd University student who has cataloged and digitized over 300 films from the ACFF Archives.

PRESENTED a screening of *Water & Power: A California Heist* as part of the Contemporary American Theater Festival's *Friday Films* series during the theater festival in July.

AWARDED five students with cash prizes for their video submissions to our ongoing Next Gen Capture Conservation Contest, designed to engage and encourage students 18 and under to create and submit short videos about their relationship to nature and the environment.

PARTNERED with the Environmental Film Festival of the Nation's Capital to co-present films at our respective film festivals — In the Hills and Hollows at DCEFF in March and Wasted! The Story of Food Waste at ACFF in October.


PARTICIPATED in the Shepherdstown 4th of July parade with ACFF staff and volunteers.


PARTNERED with the Shepherdstown Film Society for a special free screening of *In the Hills and Hollows* and a preview of 2018 festival films.
